Bank draft

Just notify your bank that we will be drafting your checking account each month for your electric bill; then complete the form (available at www.amicalolaemc.com), print and return it with your next bill payment. All future bills will be drafted until you request to be removed from the draft service.

Credit card draft

We accept Visa, MasterCard and Discover credit cards. To sign up for the credit card draft program, simply complete the form (available at www.amicalolaemc.com), print and return it with your next bill payment. All future bills will be drafted until you request to be removed from the automatic service.

You may also pay your bill in person, by mail, or over the phone using our automated bill-paying system.

Good news! Tax credits have been extended, so take advantage of energy credits covering projects undertaken in 2013. This marks the third extension of the incentive initiated by the federal Energy Policy Act of 2005. The new legislation covers 2012 upgrades along

with 2013 projects. The credits offset the cost of certain upgrades,

The last day to claim these funds is Sept. 1, 2013. At that time, unclaimed funds will be distributed for charitable purposes in accordance with Georgia unclaimed property laws.






Statement of Nondiscrimination

Shining a light on local entrepreneurs

Second in a series of articles highlighting local businesses, this issue spotlights Pickens County and the story of how a newspaper ad brought a world-class cabinetmaking duo to the North Georgia mountains.

n 2007, David Dicristina responded to a classified ad in the *Atlanta Journal Constitution* that would significantly alter the course of his career. As a senior vice president in a manufacturing company, he was ready to make a change. That change would soon involve a partner, Loreto Tari, and together they would build Timberland Cabinets into the premier custom cabinet business it is today.

The unmistakable fragrance of freshly cut wood is the first hint of the creative work taking place at Timberland Cabinets. Ten full-time employees spend their days working with their hands building solid wood custom cabinetry, and the end results are stunning. Timberland Cabinets has been featured on the cover of *Country's Best Cabins*, a design magazine about log homes. These custom cabinets can be found in homes from the mountains of Big Canoe, Ellijay and Blue Ridge to homes in Buckhead and midtown







Atlanta. Special cabinet creations from Timberland Cabinets have also found a home in Charleston, S.C., Amelia Island and Toronto, Canada. Currently, a large custom cabinet job is waiting to be shipped to Nova Scotia, a project done in conjunction with Blue Ridge area designer Cindy Trimble Kelly.

The Dicristina-Tari team works with top remodeling agencies like Weidmann Remodeling of Atlanta to place their custom cabinets in highend homes in the city. They also work with local residential homeowners and builders who want custom cabinetry at an affordable price.

Dicristina says, "If you can draw it, we can build it," and emphasizes their motto is "always say yes." He goes on to say that there is a preconceived notion that custom cabinets are not affordable; however, he says, custom cabinets don't have to be more expensive than standard ones.
