Comments from the CEO

Rural broadband legislation passes in Georgia

enate Bill 2 was signed into law on April 26. This law empowers electric membership corporations (EMCs) in Georgia to evaluate how we might contribute to the expansion of broadband services in our service area. Amicalola EMC is grateful for the leadership of

Gov. Kemp, state Sen. Steve Gooch (R-Dahlonega), state Rep. Jay Powell (R-Camilla), and their colleagues in the General Assembly, as this legislation is one more important step toward bridg-

ing the digital divide in many parts of rural Georgia.

Limited access to broadband services has put parts of rural Georgia at a tremendous disadvantage; having access will give these disadvantaged areas greater access to educational systems, new employment opportunities and an improved quality of life.

It is important to note, this new law prevents any EMC from subsidizing broadband services through the sale of electricity. This underscores the fact that any decision to move forward with broadband services or partnerships must be supported by a strong business plan

> and be able to stand on its own.

The next step for Amicalola EMC is to evaluate the options and multitude of challenges in deciding how we can best support greater

access to broadband in our communities. EMCs are known for careful planning to provide reliable, safe and affordable electricity for rural service areas. The same due diligence will be required in determining our role in helping our communities gain greater access to broadband services. We ask for your patience as we begin this process.



2019 NRECA Legislative Conference

o-op leaders from across the nation gathered in Washington, D.C., during the 2019 National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Legislative Conference held April 29-May 1. Representing

Amicalola EMC were Todd Payne, CEO, and board members David Pierce (Post #2, Fannin/Gilmer counties) and John Bennett Jr., Vice-Chairman (Post #6, Cherokee/Bartow counties). While in D.C., they met with U.S. Rep. Doug Collins (R-GA), of Georgia's 9th District, Ranking Member of the U.S. House Judiciary Committee.

During the legislative conference, key topics of discussion included NRECA's push for an infrastructure bill to go beyond roads and bridges to include expanded broadband service in rural areas and improvements in the electric grid to make it more reliable and resilient.

Congressional leaders of both parties urged electric cooperatives to continue to be a strong, bipartisan voice on these issues.

 Set your thermostat as high as comfortably possible. The smaller the difference between the indoor and outdoor temperatures, the lower your cooling costs will be.
The Department of Energy recommends setting your thermostat to 78 F when you're home and a





higher setting for when you're away.

- Use ceiling fans wisely; living room and kitchen during the day; bedrooms at night.
- Close window coverings, like curtains and blinds, during the day to block sunlight.
- Use caulk and weather stripping to seal air leaks around doors and windows.

August 31, 2019, last day to claim refunds issued in 2013





micalola EMC is attempting to locate former members whose capital credit refunds were issued in 2013 (for electric service received in 1992), but have remained unclaimed. A list of unclaimed capital credit refunds is now available for review. You may access it at www.amicalolaemc.com, by clicking on the Capital Credits tab on the homepage, or by stopping by any local Amicalola EMC office.

After a mandatory waiting period, any unclaimed capital credit refunds are distributed in accordance with Georgia's unclaimed property laws 0.C.G.A. §44-12-236. The last day to claim these funds is Aug. 31, 2019.
