Energy Cooperative and others. From there, we distribute it to homes and businesses throughout our community.

We're increasingly using more electricity generated from renewable energy sources, but we still depend on a diverse energy mix to ensure reliable power that's available to our members whenever they need it.

In addition to managing a reliable energy mix, Amicalola EMC is using technology to enhance our local grid, limit service disruptions and improve outage response times.

Automated distribution equipment helps to lessen the impact of power outages by working to pinpoint the exact location of the outage. We can then isolate the section of line affected and quickly restore the unaffected sections of the circuit, ultimately improving power reliability for our entire community.

One of the best methods for improving our services to you is monitoring trends and leading practices from other electric co-ops in Georgia and across the country. Learning from other co-ops is one of the many benefits of the cooperative business model. Because for us, it's about cooperation, not competition.

As we turn our focus to 2024, Amicalola EMC will continue working to provide the safe, reliable and affordable electricity you expect and deserve—for today and tomorrow. # Amicalola EMC donates \$480,000 for education and community development

micalola EMC is a not-for-profit electric cooperative that operates by seven core principles, one of which is members' economic participation. In a cooperative, all members contribute equally to its assets. Any surplus funds, after covering the operational expenses, are returned to the members as refunds when financial conditions permit. This year, the Amicalola EMC board of directors approved a capital credit refund in the amount of \$2.7 million to members who received electric service in 2003. Active account holders will receive a credit on their bill, while former members will receive a check by mail if we have the current mailing address.

Unclaimed funds are held for an additional five years, during which time you can claim any funds due you by providing a current mailing address. According to Georgia's unclaimed property laws, Amicalola EMC may then allocate the funds back to the communities it serves for the purpose of education, economic development and 501(c)(3) charities. Because of this, Amicalola EMC has

awarded over \$480,000 to local organizations in 2023. These unclaimed capital credits went to fund high school scholarships, Bright Ideas teacher grants, local fire department projects, economic development projects, chamber of commerce initiatives, local Rotary Club projects and to help stock local food pantries. Piedmont Mountainside (hospital) was able to receive \$40,000, \$30,000 from Amicalola EMC and a \$10,000 matching grant from Co-Bank, a rural utility lender.

As a member-owner of Amicalola EMC, you can take pride in knowing that the cooperative strives to provide safe, reliable and affordable electricity, while also supporting development and improved quality of life for its local residents.

# Holiday fire safety tips from Gilmer County Fire & Rescue and Pickens County Fire & Rescue

**G** ilmer Fire & Rescue and Pickens Fire & Rescue would like to wish everyone a happy holiday season and share some important fire safety tips to help keep your family safe during the holidays.

- Check to make sure your smoke alarms are working. Change batteries twice a year and replace smoke detectors every ten years.
- Do not overload electrical outlets.
- Use battery-operated candles.
- Check decorations for a certification label.
- Keep combustibles at least 3 feet away from heat sources.
- Never leave a fire or heat source unattended.
- Properly remove ashes from a fireplace or wood heating unit by placing them in a metal container.



DO NOT place in a combustible container like a plastic bucket or cardboard box.

- Never use gas- or charcoal-fueled devices inside.
- Turn off, unplug or extinguish all decorations when leaving or going to sleep.
- Close doors while sleeping.
